Tips for Using the World Wide Web

It is important to remember that the internet is made up of web pages and sites created by a variety of different people and organizations. No one person or group of people is responsible for the content.

Make sure that you are always cautious about believing what you read.

Some tips:

- Never disclose personal information,
- Don't send anything that you wouldn't want passed on,
- Remember that everyone you speak to on the internet is a real person, and just like real people, some are friends and some are strangers. A stranger is just as dangerous on the internet as they are in the real world.
