STRATEGIC HIGHLIGHTS

Learning

 Our brand-new recording studio opened and in the first three months, we oriented nearly 60 patrons on how to use the studio and its equipment.



• This Spring, we offered a new music lecture series: Monday Afternoons at the Opera with Mikki Reintjes.

• Summer Reading Club registration opened on June 1 and we expect more than 1,500 kids to enroll in the program. This incredible initiative aims to prevent summer learning loss by encouraging kids to read for at least 15 minutes daily throughout the summer.

- On June 13, the Big Ideas lecture series kicked off with an event that showcased Angela Sterritt, an acclaimed journalist and author, in conversation with Candis Callison, a professor and fellow journalist. More than 100 individuals attended the event.
- During the first half of the year, the technology team offered almost **100 classes for adults** and also provided **39** one-onone device clinics.



Inclusion

• Staff presented a cultural mashup event, **Robbie and Rabbits**, celebrating Lunar New Year and Robbie Burns Day, to a packed Welsh Hall.

• The Library arranged a haftseen table and featured live music to mark **Norooz**. Additionally, our librarians curated various resources to encourage the learning and comprehension of Iran's political state.





- We installed new exterior book drop bins to address an accessibility challenge with our previous after-hours book return slot. Now, patrons can return items to the Library anytime without climbing stairs.
- We presented another series of Indigenous Storytelling by Ta Síiýuxwa tl'a Skwxwú7meshulh (The Elders of the Squamish People),

attended by rapt audiences and three school groups.

• This year's Booktopia: A Literary Festival for Young People was presented by the Youth Department in partnership with West Vancouver Schools. The festival featured an author talk in French with Mélanie Watt, the creator of *Scaredy Squirrel*, and a talk accompanied by a live drawing demonstration with author and illustrator Ben Clanton.

"This will undoubtedly help our French Immersion students not only read more French but also help in their understanding of French culture and language." The 23rd annual North Shore Writers Festival returned in-person for the first time since 2019. The festival, a partnership with North Vancouver City Library, North Vancouver District Public Library, and West Vancouver Memorial Library, was hosted in West Vancouver this year.

• We partnered with the West Vancouver Art Museum to present The Bricktacular West Coast Modern Show, an exhibition featuring LEGO® recreations of iconic West Vancouver homes. Part of West Coast Modern Week, the exhibition opened on May 5 with a reception attended by more than **200** people. Hundreds more visited the Library to admire the display.



• Staff participated in outreach events at the West Vancouver Community Cultural Festival, National Indigenous Peoples' Day, Seniors' Activity Centre, **Squamish Nation Elder's** Centre, and more.
