INSPIRING STORIES

WVML won the International Federation of Library Associations and Institutions (IFLA) Green Library Project Award for our Climate Writer in Residence program! The win came four months after the Library won the British Columbia Library Association's Eureka Award for our *Climate Future* initiative.

WVML Director Stephanie Hall attended the 88th IFLA World Library and Information Congress on August 22 in Rotterdam to present on the Library's work and accept the award.

"This project truly deserves to be awarded for its innovative contribution that combines literature and climate in a unique way by creating programmes of education for sustainable development that involve the entire community through a variety of events. In addition, effective energy-saving measures led to a 'greener' design of the library itself. STRATEGIC HIGHLIGHTS

Learning

- Since May, more than 100 kids and adults have learned how to use the Library's Recording Studio. The studio is particularly popular among 50 returning users.
- August was the busiest month on record for technology programs. We hosted a total of 296 people in The Lab for programs like Audio Puzzles, Digitization Basics, Device Clinics, and more.



- This year's second Big Ideas lecture was held on August 11. More than 150 patrons attended a talk on Space Telescopes with writer and historian of technology Chris Gainor.
- The Summer Music Series returned to our rooftop community demonstration garden with performances by Celso Machado, a Middle Eastern ensemble, and the Bonnie Northgraves Quartet.

Integrity

- As of August, circulation surpassed 2019's levels. In this quarter alone, we loaned more than 200,000 items.
- In collaboration with North Vancouver City Library and North Vancouver District
 Public Library, we presented The Fire Still Burns: An Evening with Squamish Elder Sam George. The event was completely sold out.
- A full house enjoyed an exciting and informative talk about the future of sustainable housing and technology by Remi Charron, an expert in the field of net-zero housing.
- We launched an Augmented Reality Tour of the Library!
 Patrons can scan the codes at five stations around the Main Hall with their smartphone camera to learn more about the Library.
