

In June, we presented a new phone-in program called Dial-a-Story: Indigenous Storytelling by Squamish Elders, in partnership with the Squamish Elder's Centre. This program sought to reach out to community members who are not able to connect with Library programs online. The sessions were all fully registered and had lengthy waitlists.

On **June 7**, we reintroduced a limited number of individual study spaces.







STRATEGIC HIGHLIGHTS Learning

 Thanks to our partners at the West Vancouver Historical Society, we presented West Vancouver Girl Guides: A Centennial Celebration in our Art Gallery space. This show featured archival photos, vintage uniforms, and guiding memorabilia.



 In May, we hosted local fashion historian Ivan Sayers for a lecture on Fashions of the West Vancouver Pioneers.
 The program received such an overwhelming response that we ran it a second time and shared a recording of the lecture. As a result, over 400 people were able to enjoy it.



 Our large-scale virtual programs for kids and teens thrived.
 Almost 400 students from 11 different West Vancouver elementary schools participated in the Reading Link Challenge.
 We also launched our second fully virtualized Summer
 Reading Club, with over 1,700 kids and teens registered, compared to 1,000 registrants in 2020. In this quarter, our Technology department ran 64 programs for adults, including 41 one-onone device clinics.

Inclusion


- A new partnership with the Squamish Nation Elder's Center has led to promotion of Library services in a flyer that was distributed to all Squamish Nation Elders.
- We added to our collection of lendable technology and started loaning WiFi hotspots and pre-loaded iPods.

Community

- The North Shore libraries held the first-ever virtual edition of the North Shore Writers Festival in April 2021 and it was a huge success, with over 570 attendees tuning into six livestreamed events.
- Sponsored by the WVML
 Foundation, the popular

 Readers' Rooftop patio
 reopened for the summer, now featuring a rooftop garden maintained by the Master Gardeners.





- Our English language learning volunteers won a very well-deserved North Shore Community Resources Community Spirit Award for their work facilitating our English Conversation Online program.
- The Youth Department resumed outreach efforts, including two drive-through events with West Vancouver Schools (WVS), over a dozen virtual Summer Reading Club visits, and WVS' virtual Kindergarten Connections program for 50 families.

Integrity

- We took our librarians' expertise in readers' advisory online with the launch of our new **BookMatch** service.
 Patrons can now simply fill out an online form with their reading preferences to receive personalized recommendations.
- We launched our Climate
 Future: Climate Action Toolkit,
 outlining achievable individual
 actions to take in the areas
 of food, stuff, transportation,
 buildings, and nature.
- Thanks to funding from the WVML Foundation, we introduced the new Kids Lucky

- **Day Collection**, to make very popular books available for kids and families who come into the Library to browse.
- The three North Shore libraries won the British Columbia Library Association Building Better Communities Award for their Take-Home Tech initiative. Thanks to a grant secured by WVML's Head of Technology Sarah Felkar, the initiative delivered 400
