STRATEGIC HIGHLIGHTS

Learning

- The Library offered programs and resources around Bill C-18, the Online News Act. Following the Act, platforms Facebook and Google announced that they would no longer show news content to Canadians. Our librarians compiled resources on Canadian News and offered tech classes on the impact of the bill and how to access publications for free with PressReader. More than 280 people accessed these resources.
- Author Talks this quarter featured J.B. MacKinnon, JJ Lee, Joanna Baxter, and Wiley Wei-Chiun Ho.

 We presented two new music lecture series: Classic Albums with Dr. Mike Daley and The History of Christmas Carols with Kevin Zakresky.

"I believe offering this music history program is a great idea and I am very appreciative of the West Vancouver Memorial Library for making it available."



Inclusion

- Our Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion (EDI) Committee drafted a WVML Accessibility Plan, in collaboration with the District of West Vancouver. This work is required under the Province's Accessibility Act.
- Our cataloguing staff implemented vocabulary from Homosaurus, an international linked dataset of 2SLGBTQIA+ terms, to support improved access to our 2SLGBTQIA+ collections.



 We hosted a Coast Salish Wool Weaving workshop for kids with Spelexilh Anjeanette Dawson.

- Libraries were noted as the service most used by newcomers in a recent survey by Impact North Shore.
- This fall, the Advanced ELL Book Club read The Dancehall Years by Joan Haggerty, set on Bowen Island. After the book club meetings were over, the facilitators and some of the participants travelled to Bowen together to look at some of the sites that were mentioned in the book.


Community

 The 2023/2024 North Shore Authors Collection launched, with 76 authors in this year's collection.

- We presented Boardwalks
 & Byways in our Art Gallery, an exhibit showcasing photographs of waterfront landmarks and thoroughfares from 1900 to 1920 that still exist today.
- Our Youth Department launched the Time to Grow space planning consultation.
 We heard from 424 survey respondents, 350+ weekly voting exercise participants, and three focus groups about how changes to our existing space could help them learn better, use the Library more, and discover the world of imagination.





 In partnership with Lighthouse Park Preservation Society, we presented a lecture by Colin Spratt about ancient trees, particularly in Stanley Park, Lighthouse Park, and the North Shore. 87 people attended, and one said:

"The best interpretive talk I've ever attended".



Integrity

WVML participated in BC
 Libraries Present, a new virtual event series that provides access to award-winning authors to library users across the province.

Five new meeting pods
 were installed in the Library:
 two in the Lower Level, two
 in the West Wing, and one
 in the Room 14 teen space.
 These first-come, first-served
 spaces can be used for virtual
 meetings, phone calls, or quiet
 study. These were funded
 by the Province of British
 Columbia through the Ministry
 of Municipal Affairs.



Library use continues to be up year to date across all major indicators, including an overall 10% increase in circulation (digital and physical), 25% increase in in-person visits, and a 47% increase in program attendances.
