#### **INSPIRING STORIES**

From January 26 through March 10, we hosted the touring replica of Carey Newman's Witness Blanket. Inspired by a universal symbol of protection—a woven blanket—the Witness Blanket comprises items collected from residential schools, Survivors, churches, governments, and other cultural sites across Canada. Each object tells a personal and harrowing story of loss, strength, resilience, and pride from Survivors.

Our hosting of this powerful exhibition, which has been called "a national monument," was made possible due to equal funding from the WVML Foundation and the Province of British Columbia through the Ministry of Municipal Affairs.

The Library had **52,367 visits** during the six-week exhibition. This includes more than **500 attendees** at our in-person events. Additionally, at least 200 students and young people tuned into a YouTube Live talk with Carey Newman. We also hosted 50 Squamish Elders for a private viewing of the Blanket.

### STRATEGIC HIGHLIGHTS

#### Learning

- Our popular mason bee lending program returned this spring. In its third successful year, this program has grown into a vibrant community of 86 mason bee enthusiasts across West Vancouver and beyond. These patrons can borrow a mason bee "bungalow" along with 10 to 15 mason bee cocoons from the Library's bee hotel, kickstarting their journey into beekeeping.
- We hosted a sold-out **Tech Talk** on Social Robots and Elder Care with the UBC IDEA Lab.



- Our librarians curated a resource topic page called Coping with World Events to help people have conversations about difficult topics and distressing news.
- The **TED Talks** livestream returned to the Welsh Hall April 16 – 19. This year's topics focused on the unique challenges and opportunities driven by the technological revolution.

#### Inclusion

• With help from our community, we decorated the Library for Lunar New Year and Norooz. One volunteer decorator said:

"Being able to celebrate the Lunar New Year here, especially as a newcomer, is immensely exciting for me. It's a wonderful experience to immerse myself in the cultural inclusion that this occasion offers."

- Guided by the **District of West** Vancouver's Accessibility **Plan**, all Library staff teams are working on improving accessibility in the Library.
- We introduced free period products in our washrooms to reduce menstrual stigma.
- The Library partnered with the District to promote National AccessAbility Week, May **25-June 1**. More than **60** preschoolers and caregivers attended a Words Matter **Storytime** we presented at the Community Centre.
- We started a new Farsi Conversation Group for newcomers in partnership with the Third Bridge Society.



• Our Technology and Accessible Services staff launched a new Accessibility-Focused Device Clinic and offered 10 one-onone clinics in Q2.

#### Community

- We conducted our General Library User Survey from April 8 through 22. We heard from more than 3,000 patrons-30% more than the last survey in 2019.
- The Library joined the West Vancouver District, West Vancouver Place for Sport, Harry Jerome Oval Fundraising Committee and West Vancouver Schools' **District Parent Advisory Committee** in presenting An Evening with Valerie Jerome at the Kay Meek Theatre. The free event was completely **sold out**.



- Library staff attended outreach events including North Shore Seniors Health Expo, West Vancouver Pride Picnic, and Indigenous People's Day.
- Students at Cedardale and Pauline Johnson schools participated in a **French** reading challenge presented by the Library and **Canadian** Parents for French.
- The Library's Business Manager participated in the **Cultural Safety and Humility** Training with the Squamish Ocean Canoe Family, the International Sustainability Education Foundation, and North Shore Emergency Management (NSEM). This training is part of NSEM's work towards developing a North Shore Resilience Strategy.


• Shuang Music School partnered with the Library to use our Recording Studio space for students to record with their teachers.

#### Integrity

- We evaluated our monthly digitization drop-in session and adapted it into a bookable station in the Community Computing Centre. This new **Digitization on Demand Station** can accommodate around **200** hours a month of digitization, compared to the monthly two hours of the previous drop-in model.
- We analyzed the results from our fall 2023 Time to **Grow!** youth space planning consultation campaign. Our

report found that patrons want a safer and more accessible youth space that meets West Vancouver's gold standard with more seating, more delineated space for different ages and noise levels, and more play and wonder.

• Our library received news of a new one-time grant of \$23,800 from the **Province of** British Columbia through the **Ministry of Municipal Affairs** to enhance library services and respond to changing needs. Funding has been used for staff safety training, five individual study pods, hosting the Witness Blanket, coming into compliance with new accessibility legislation, and
